Rear Admiral Thomas Martin Ward, Jr. Obituary

RADM Ward was the Berkeley's 4th commanding officer from July 1967 to January 1969. Our condolences go out to RADM Ward's family. Following is the obituary.

Rear Admiral Thomas Martin Ward, Jr. (USN retired), age 89, son of the late Tom and Edith Ward of Rockwood, Tennessee, passed into his final rest surrounded by his loving family on January 9, 2018 in Virginia Beach, Virginia. Funeral services were held at First Presbyterian Church of Virginia Beach on January 16, 2018. Interment at Arlington National Cemetery with full military honors will occur later this year.

Tom was born on December 4, 1928, in Pontiac, Michigan and

Tom was born on December 4, 1928 in Pontiac, Michigan and raised in Rockwood, Tennessee. He graduated from Tennessee Military Institute and attended Virginia Military Institute (Class of 1950B). He then received an appointment to the United States Naval Academy, graduating with the Class of 1951 and was commissioned as an Ensign. He reported to the USS ENGLISH (DDG-696) as the First Lieutenant and Gunnery Officer. On September 14, 1951, Tom married his "Peg of My Heart," Miss Peggy Dunn of Knoxville, Tennessee, and together they launched their life in the U.S. Navy.

Tom reported to Minesweeping Officers School, followed by tours as Executive Officer aboard the USS TOWHEE (AM-388) and the Commanding Officer of the USS CARDINAL (AMS-4). Tom would continue to serve at sea in destroyers, taking great pride in being a 'tin can' sailor. A breather in sea duty sent Tom to the Naval Postgraduate School in the Weapons curriculum followed by a year of further study for a master's degree at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Boston. He was then assigned as Weapons Department Head on The USS GYATT

(DDG-1). Sea duty was followed by a tour as the Missile Flight Safety Officer for satellite and ICBM launches from Vandenberg Air Force base and the Pacific Missile Range Facility in Lompoc, California, including a TAD assignment for most of 1962 to the Joint Task Force 8 on Johnson Island as the Missile Flight Safety Officer for the last nuclear weapons atmospheric tests.

He then became the Executive Officer of the USS BUCHANAN (DDG-14) and deployed to the Gulf of Tonkin off the coast of North Vietnam. He returned stateside, attended the Naval War College Command and Staff Course, with a follow on assignment to the Weapons Department at the USNA teaching weapon system engineering. Tom then took command of the USS BERKELEY (DDG-15) which included two deployments to Vietnam. Back home, he returned to the Naval War College while concurrently completing the Senior Officers course and earning a master degree in Marine Affairs at the University of Rhode Island. He transferred to the Naval Ordnance Systems Command in Washington DC as Project Manager for the NATO Sea Sparrow Surface Missile Systems Project. This was the first successful multinational weapon system development and production project under NATO's aegis, and is still operational today.

Tom was subsequently assigned as Commander Destroyer

Squadron SEVEN. He returned to Washington DC for duty in the Weapons Systems Directorate of Naval Sea Systems Command. He was promoted to Rear Admiral and transferred to the Office of the DCNO for Surface Warfare as Deputy Commander for surface ship command systems where he served as Chairman to the NATO Sea Sparrow Steering Committee. He then became Commander Naval Surface Forces Middle Pacific in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. He returned to Washington for his last tour as Deputy Commander for Surface Combatant Ship Programs.

After 31 years in the Navy, Tom retired in 1982 and then worked 10 more years for combat system engineering and ships maintenance firms in the Tidewater Virginia region; fully retiring in 1993 to devote himself to his family and to his community. He was a trustee for the USNA Foundation (Athletic and Scholarship Programs). Tom served as an elder at First Presbyterian Church where he also was an active participant in the Men's Prayer Breakfast group and Stephen's Ministry. An avid orchid horticulturalist, he became a senior judge with the American Orchid Society and later served as a Trustee. He was an active member and served as President of the Tidewater Orchid Society. Tom also served as Director and later President of the Virginia Beach Beautification Commission. He was a Founding Director of the Virginia Beach Horticultural Foundation and Chairman of the Virginia Flower and Garden Show. He belonged to the "Over the Hill Gang," a group of fellow military and first

Malone, Patrick Bartley FORT PLAIN, N.Y. Patrick Bartley, "Bart" Malone passed away in his home on Wednesday, August 9, 2017. Born on March 14, 1950, he was the son of the late Joseph Malone and Cynthia Malone of Blue Point, N.Y. Bart was a graduate of the State University of New York at Oswego. He recently retired from his position as environmental chemist for New York State, which he held for 28 years. Prior to that service he was a research biologist at Roswell Park Institute. Bart served in active duty for the [United States Navy](#) during the [Vietnam War](#) (OS3 1969-73, USS Berkeley) and went to college on the GI Bill. He grew up in Malverne, N.Y., and Blue Point. He was a naturalist which he attributed to his maternal grandfather, Arthur Bartley, who was one of the founders of Ducks Unlimited. He loved the outdoors (especially the Great South Bay, where he lived and clammed as a young man), football, and riding his motorcycles. He is survived by his two sons, Sean Malone and Jered Malone, as well as his sister, Anne Malone.
