The Guided Missile Destroyer USS BERKELEY is now decommissioned and transferred to another navy, and all the farewells and ceremonies were completed in a fashion which we can all be proud. Thirty years of history was brought to a close with all the pomp and circumstance fitting for a great ship of the United States Navy. Her final party brought together members of her first crew, her last crew and many from all the years between. It was a great and memorable week of celebration and recognition for her 30 years of naval service. CDR Fred J. Mallgrave III and his crew performed a superb job in making this such an elegant event.

On Wednesday, the 30th of September, a Berkeley only ceremony was conducted by CDR Mallgrave and many crewmembers received awards and recognition for outstanding performance during her final months. At this ceremony it was my pleasure to address the crew and present CDR Mallgrave with a letter of appreciation on behalf of all former crewmembers for making this occasion a memorable event for all Berkeley crews, past and present. in this newsletter. That evening the final deck log entry was made by LCDR Robert Senter, the ships Executive Officer.

"23:59: AS DIRECTED BY THE CHIEF OF NAVAL OPERATIONS, BERKELEY DECOMMISSIONS. AS HER COMMISSIONED LIFE CEASES, HERE AT PIER THIRTEEN, ALL CONDITIONS ARE NORMAL, ALL SPACES ARE CLEAN. BERKELEY'S CREW SLEEPS THEIR SLUMBER, A WELL-DESERVED REST, STOUT HEARTS LIKE OAKS, BEAT IN THEIR CHEST. LIKE THEIR SHIPMATES BEFORE THEM, THEY GAVE HER THEIR BEST, NOW AS DIRECTED BY CNO, WE LAY BERKELEY TO REST."

On Thursday, the 1st of October, formal ceremonies were conducted, the ship's commissioning pennant and colors were hauled down and the crew departed the ship. It was a somber and somewhat emotional moment for many of us present, but we all stood proud and accepted the inevitable that ships are not forever and must eventually pass on into history. She will not be forgotten and our Association will keep her memory alive and her past crews together long into the future.

HS Themistocles (D 221)

Following additional underway training HS THEMISTOCLES departed San Diego on the 9th of December, 1992 and headed towards her new home port at the Naval Base in Athens, Greece. On board was U.S. Navy combat systems and boiler control troubleshooters who rode the ship to Panama. Steaming in company with THEMISTOCLES was HS FORMION (Ex-Strauss (DDG-16)). Their route took them through the Panama Canal and onward for the Atlantic crossing.

The crew was quite anxious to get home by Christmas, however, they ran into a hurricane after leaving Panama and had to change their heading and adjust speed. The ship pulled into Burmuda to recover from the storm and then headed for home on the final leg. They didn't make it in time for Christmas, but did arrive before New Years.
