Interest continues to be high for the September Reunion

Reunion plans have been finalized and it will be a great weekend for all. For those who returned RSVP cards indicating they are definitely attending or plan to attend, hotel reservation forms and other reunion information is included with this newsletter. For those not attending a summary of the events are listed in this article.

There will be a Friday night reception with hot Hors D'oeuvres and a hosted bar for the first hour, and will be casual. The Saturday night banquet dinner will be a buffet with three main choices plus numerous side dishes and desserts. Dress is informal coat and tie for the men and equivalent dress for the ladies. A DJ will provide music for entertainment and dancing.

The hospitality suite will be open from noon Thursday until 11:00 PM and during the day Friday and Saturday. We will stock the bar. The ballroom assigned for our Friday and Saturday evening events will be available during the day for gathering and to make purchases from the ship's store. The room must be vacated by 3:00 pm both days.

Group rate arrangements have been made for the Combination Hoover Dam tour & Lake Mead boat cruise and includes a buffet lunch. The tour departs from the hotel at 8:30 am and returns around 5:30. The tour ends with visits to Ethel M's Chocolate Factory and Botanical Gardens. The cost is \$45.50 per person. There are other tours listed in the packet and you may call their 800 number to make individual arrangements.

Hotel reservations should be made individually using the enclosed form. The cutoff date for blocked rooms is 21 August, 2000. After that date rooms are on a "space available" basis at the higher prevailing rate. Seventy-five rooms have been blocked with 50 of them for Thursday arrivals.

Pre-registration is \$50 per person and payment is requested by 15 August. No refunds after 18 September when the final head-count is due to the hotel banquet department. Make check payable to: USS Berkeley Association.

X.O. IN THE SPOTLIGHT

RADM Richard C. Avrit was born and raised in the Pacific Northwest and received his appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy from Alaska. He graduated with the class of 1953 and served 31 years on active duty. He holds a Bachelor's degree in Engineering, a Master's degree in Electronics from the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, and is a 1960 graduate of the U.S. Naval War College.

During his naval career, Admiral Avrit had numerous operational and technical jobs, both at-sea and ashore. He served afloat in various destroyer and staff billets including XO of the USS Berkeley (DDG-15) 1966-68 and command of the USS Sumner County (LST-1148), USS Sellers (DDG-11) and USS Harry E. Yarnell (CG-17). His sea tours were evenly distributed between the Pacific and Atlantic fleets and he saw combat action in both the Korean and Vietnamese Wars.

While serving ashore, Admiral Avrit had engineering jobs in weapon and electronic system development including field-testing and evaluation of Navy weapons systems; combat system requirements definition; program formulation; and project management. Admiral Avrit served as Chief of Staff, Commander Surface Forces, Atlantic until selected for flag in 1979. Following selection, he continued his project management role as Program Manager for building the Saudi Arabian Navy at \$1 Billion annually. Avrit subsequently served as Director of Navy Logistics and as Director of Strategic Sealift, both jobs relating to the logistics infrastructure of the Navy to sustain peacetime readiness and wartime capability.

Following retirement in 1984, Admiral Avrit developed new computer technology programs for Information Spectrum, Inc. He subsequently served as CEO/President of the Military Data Corporation, a joint venture of the U.S. Naval Institute and Information Spectrum, Inc. for development of an

online database of worldwide military forces and their equipment. Admiral Avrit left that position in 1989 to serve as a small business consultant in computer applications in the construction industry. As of 1998, he was fully retired, but actively engaged in web development and maintenance for charitable organizations as well as other church and community work.

Dick met his wife, Dayne, on his first shore duty assignment in Monterey while at USNPGS. They were married in 1959, lived their first year together in Carmel while Dick completed USNPGS, then embarked upon a life filled with adventure, challenge and fulfillment. They have a daughter, Tamra, currently a student at the National War College, an ex-USMC son-in-law who is a pilot for United Airlines, and a three-year old grandchild—all of whom live across the lake from them in Montclair, VA— near the Quantico USMC base.
