MASTER CHIEF IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Master Chief Yeoman (Surface Warfare) Curtis Kiesau was born in 1948 in Waukon, lowa, where he attended local schools. He studied one year at the University of Wisconsin, Stevens Point before enlisting in the Navy in September 1967. After completing recruit training at San Diego, he reported to USS BERKELEY (DDG-15), the first of many varied duty stations and ships, which also included the Defense Intelligence School/Defense Intelligence Agency, Washington, DC, 1970-1971; Defense Language Institute West Coast (German language training), Monterey, California, 1972; U.S. Navy Representative's Office, Munich, West Germany, 1972-1974; Commander, Submarine Squadron Six (embarked USS L. Y. SPEAR (AS-36)), 1974-1975; USS SPRUANCE (DD-963) (Plankowner), 1975-1977; Naval Junior ROTC Area Six Program Manager, Naval Base, Charleston, South Carolina, 1977-1981; Commander, Cruiser-Destroyer Group Two, 1981-1984: Administrative Branch Supervisor, Service School Command, Great Lakes, Illinois, 1984-1990; Personnel Exchange Liaison Representative, U.S. American Embassy, Bonn, Germany, 1990-1992; and Command Master Chief, USS GETTYSBURG (CG-64). Master Chief Kiesau earned designations as Naval Intelligence Clerk in 1971 and Enlisted Surface Warfare Specialist in 1982.

Master Chief Kiesau retired in September 1994 having completed 27 years of active service. He attended the University of Wisconsin, La Crosse, where he earned his BA in Liberal Arts and was employed by the U.S. Geological Survey at the Upper Midwest Environmental Science Center in La Crosse. After residing there for seven years, he and his wife relocated to Wausau, Wisconsin where they are actively involved in remodeling a home and he is employed with a nationally known insurance company. Master Chief Kiesau is married to the former Carolyn Thomas (formerly a Disbursing Clerk Third Class of Naval Station Long Beach) of Ashton, Maryland. Their daughter, husband and brand new grandson live in Waukesha, Wisconsin.

Master Chief Kiesau's personal decorations include the Navy Commendation Medal, Navy Achievement Medal (w/Gold Star), Combat Action Ribbon, Joint

Meritorious Unit Award, Meritorious Unit Commendation, Navy "E" Ribbon (2 Awards), Navy Good Conduct Medal (w/Silver Star), Navy Expeditionary Medal, National Defense Service Medal (w/Silver Star) Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Vietnam Service Medal (w/2 Bronze Stars), Southwest Asia Service Medal (w/Bronze Star), Sea Service Deployment Ribbon (w/3 Bronze Star), Navy & Marine Corps Overseas Service Ribbon (w/Bronze Star), Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross Unit Citation, Republic of Vietnam Civil Actions Unit Citation, NATO Peacekeeping Service Medal and Sharpshooter Pistol Shot Medal.

The last of the Adams Class DDG's

The only Adams Class Destroyer remaining in service is HS Kimon D-218 (ex–USS Semmes DDG-18) operating out of Salamis Naval Base near Athens. Ex-Semmes was commissioned on 10 December 1962 and is the only ship of her class to exceed forty years of continuous active service. HS Nearchos D-219 (ex-USS Waddell DDG-24) was decommissioned on 18 July 2003 at Souda Bay, Crete where ex-Berkeley and all of the other decommissioned ships are berthed. Ex-Berkeley was the second longest of the class in service with 39 years and 2 months.

On 19 June 2003 ex-USS Richard E. Byrd (DDG-23) was sunk off Crete as a target by the Hellenic Navy with three missiles and two torpedoes. The ship was never placed into service, but was towed to Greece and used for spare parts.


2004 active duty pay raise is 3.7%

Sea Tales "The Plankowner"



Upon returning to the U.S. following three years in Londonderry, Northern Ireland, he was assigned to the Long Beach Naval Shipyard as a Ship's Superintendent. At the shipyard was the battleship USS Nevada (BB-36) being prepped in bright red lead paint to be the center target ship for the atomic bomb Able Test at Bikini Island, which was conducted in 1946.



CWO4 Barrett was a member of the commissioning crew of the Nevada in 1916 and served aboard her until 1925. Nevada was his third battleship and the

favorite of five he served on during seventeen consecutive years at sea. With the Nevada in sight, he grabbed a shipyard worker with a skill saw, walked up to the quarterdeck and said to the OOD, "I am a plankowner of this ship and I am here to get my plank." The OOD did not appear to want to argue with this salty looking officer and stepped aside as the worker cut a plank right out of the quarterdeck. I still have the 18" long teak wood plank shown in the photo.

Here we go again!

For the third time in the past 40 years the Signalman rate will become history by 30 September 2004. The Quartermaster rate will absorb about ten percent of the 2,322 SM's in the Navy. The remainder will have to convert to other rates and must make a decision by 31 January. The Navy's ruling that does not allow rate changes after 14 years of service is being waived for SM's. At present SM's only spend 5 to 7 percent of their time doing signalman work.


REUNIONS
