There is parking for Rv'ers, but not any hookups. I'm in the process of finding RV facilities. Information cards regarding reunion attendance will be sent out along with the January 2008 newsletter. There are many points of interest in the area and know that everyone will find that this was an excellent choice of location for our reunion.

I'm hoping that our Association's website will be updated and offering more features in the very near future. Jim Barrett has assumed the position of our Webmaster. Dale Johnson, due to the demands of his business, has had to transfer this responsibility to someone who has a little more time to devote to it but will be willing to help out, if at all possible, if needed.

I've been working with Gerry Hansen, Ship's Store Manager, on procuring new items for our ship's store. I've found a Master Chief Duane LeDoux completed his sophomore year in high school in LaPorte, Indiana in 1951. He then moved on to the East Coast in the Cohasset, Massachusetts's area. Realizing his quest for greener pastures was not working out; he tried to join the U.S. Marine Corp, but was not accepted due to physical disqualifications.

He then moved on to what became the beginning of his naval career. The Navy took care of correcting his physical problems and he reported to Boot Camp at Bainbridge, Maryland. Following boot camp he was ordered to Machinist Mate Class A School. After graduation he was assigned to the USS AULT (DD-698) and during this tour the ship made a 'round the world cruise that concluded with duty off Korea.

Completing his first sea tour he reported for shore duty with the Sherman Field Crash Crew at Pensacola, Florida. Then, back to sea aboard the USS ABBOT (DD-629), a Fletcher Class Destroyer that did not have an inboard passageway to the forward engine room. Not a pleasant way to get to the engineering spaces in stormy weather. The same was true for his next duty station, USS ROOKS (DD-804).

In 1962 MM1 LeDoux's career took an upswing when he received orders to Camden, New Jersey to become a member of the nucleus crew for the new Guided Missile Destroyer, USS BERKELEY (DDG-15). He was assigned to the "A" Gang for he had attended Air Condition/Refrigeration School in 1957. He recalls going from two reefer compressors to an air-conditioned ship was a real wake up call. While serving in Berkeley he was promoted to Chief Petty Officer and qualified as Engineering Officer of the Watch Underway.

Chief LeDoux's next assignment in Charleston, South Carolina was to place the former USS DECATUR (DD-931) back into the fleet as DDG-31, another plank

owner venture. Upon completion of sea trials and acceptance he was transferred to the pre-commissioning crew of the USS BARRY (DD-933), also in Charleston. Following the ship's commissioning, fitting out and sea trials, he was sent to Instructor Training School, Newport, Rhode Island.

Upon graduation Chief LeDoux was assigned to the Destroyer School, also in Newport. After a brief period he was placed in charge of the Technical Training Group preparing future Engineering Officers and Main Propulsion Assistants for duty on 1200-PSI steam plants. On July 9, 1971 he was piped ashore with fellow instructors on each side of the stairwell, with his wife, Jean, his mother, dad, brothers and sister looking on. "It was a rush that to this day gives me goose bumps! Wish I could do it again."



#### Last two Arleigh Burke DDG's named

The Navy has announced that William P. Lawrence (DDG-110) and Spruance (DDG-111) will be the names of the last two of 61 ships in the building plan.

VADM Lawrence was the first Navy pilot to fly Mach 2. In 1967 he was awarded the Silver Star for combat service in Vietnam after being shot down and captured spending six years as a POW.

Admiral Spruance commanded Task Force 16 at the Battle of Midway in 1942. He fought and won many other major Pacific War engagements including the Battle of the Philippine Sea.

- Retired from the Navy Reserves as CTMC in November 1992.
- Retired from Northrop Grumman May 1, 2007.

- Looking forward to making a final move back home to Rochester, NY in June or July.

### New Security Facility at Port of Long Beach

What's going on at our old home port of Long Beach? Homeland Security's new Security Control Center. Along with

ABC, NBC, and FOX was Scoop Clark and his trusty photog Lilipad, attended (well more like gate crashed) ground-breaking ceremonies held on Tuesday, April 3 at the Port of Long Beach.



LONG BEACH—04/16/07 - The Port of Long Beach has started construction of a \$20 million Security Command and Control Center, a post-9/11 facility for the port's expanding Security Division and law enforcement partnership.

The 25,000-square-foot facility will serve as the communications hub and headquarters for the Port of Long Beach Security Division and Harbor Patrol, and also house security units from the Long Beach Police Department and Port of Los Angeles.

The Three-story structure will also accommodate the US Coast Guard, US

Customs and Border Protection (USCBP), and Marine Exchange during any emergency situation. The new facility is being funded by the Port of Long Beach and the US Department of Homeland Security, which contributed \$8.1 million toward the total cost.

According to the port, the facility will be a "regional resource" that will house emergency management facilities including a Department Operations Center (DOC) for use in coordinating law enforcement response to emergencies anywhere in San Pedro Bay port complex.



The San Pedro Bay is home to both the Port of Long Beach and its neighboring Port of Los Angeles, the two busiest container ports in the country. Together the ports' combined container throughput makes them one of the three largest "load centers" in the

The center is expected to open in late 2008

#### NASA Story by Don Carson



The 20<sup>th</sup> of April 2007 started out unlike the usual Friday where everyone is counting down to the weekend. I was starting to work late (1000 hours) and would be working until (1800) after normal quit-

ting time of 1630 hours. We were in Building 30 checking out new software and hardware for the Mission Control Center (MCC), so that Shuttle Flight Controllers could have better insight into shuttle operations while the vehicle is in space.

At about 1430 hours we received a notice via the 1MC to stay inside because there was a "Security Incident" in Building 44. Because we live and work in the Petroleum Refining Capital of the world we are totally accustomed to "Sheltering in place" for chemical spills... one teammate wondered what kind of spill could have happened at Building 44? My supervisor tuned in the local news channel. (We have Closed Circuit TV in our work space so that we can monitor our students.) We were shocked to find that there was a gunman in Building 44. For the next two plus hours we continued our equipment checkout with one ear and one eye tuned to the TV just like the rest of the world. NASA and contractor employees were allowed to leave by routes other than near Building 44. Several of us working in Building 30 had parked in the parking lot that was closed off because of the incident. We saw exactly what was unfolding as all of the rest of the country (world) saw it. We were not told by NASA or United Space Alliance supervisors because they didn't want "to cause us to panic."

At about 1630 we saw police coming out of the building, sadly heard reports of deaths. We were subsequently told the dead were the supervisor and the perpetrator and we learned of the survivor. Traffic was allowed to resume in the vicinity of the Building 44 and surrounding parking lots. We finished our checkout at about 1730 hours and went home. Most of the NASA Community was not harmed, although counseling services have been offered to every one of us. There will be lasting memories and three NASA Families will never be the same.

I went home Friday expecting strict security checks on Monday when the next work week began, but there were no extra car or personnel searches on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. What could NASA do? There are about 10, 000 people coming onto the Center everyday... everyone can not be searched.

I was not raised to think I was different then my fellow man. Since I was raised with American Natives, I played with them, hunted with them and many of my friends died in Vietnam just like all other men, so I was kind a set back. Maybe a little naïve or stupid either way I was set back.
