# Jacksonville Reunion Update

Planning for our next reunion in Jacksonville,

# Jacksonville's Naval History

Following is an overview of the U.S. Navy history in the Jacksonville area, and the primary focus is on Jacksonville Naval Air Station and Mayport Naval Station.

In the late 1930's, aggressive lobbying by the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce helped persuade President Roosevelt and Congress to establish a Navy complex in Jacksonville. A \$15 million congressional appropriation and a \$1.1 million bond issue provided large tracts of land along the St. Johns River and Ribault Bay that were turned over to the Navy. Jacksonville Naval Air Station became the first and only military installation ever established in the U.S. as a result of a gift from local citizens.

By the end of WW II, more than 11,000 pilots and 10,000 air crewmen had earned their "wings" at Jacksonville NAS. The vast majority of these young men saw combat. Over 30,000 gunners were also trained. The roster of early war graduates included Joseph Kennedy Jr., the son of America's ambassador to Britain. The Kennedy family has enjoyed a strong connection with Jacksonville area bases. As a young Navy officer, John F. Kennedy was once hospitalized at Jacksonville NAS after he was involved in a PT boat mishap. The designation of Mayport Naval Station as home port for the USS John F. Kennedy continued that relationship. Jacksonville NAS also played an important role in supporting the Vietnam war effort.

In response to the U.S.'s entry into WWII, three runways over 6,000 feet long were in operation at Jacksonville NAS, as were seaplane runways in the St. Johns River. Overhaul and repair facilities were built to rework the station's planes, and today it is named the Fleet Readiness Center Southeast.

In 1946, the Navy established the Blue Angels Flight Demonstration Team in Jacksonville. Their first air show was at what is now Craig Municipal Airport at the corner of St. Johns Bluff Road and Atlantic Blvd.

By 1949, nearly half of the Navy's aircraft on the East Coast were stationed in Jacksonville. A year later, Congress passed an emergency appropriation bill that provided almost \$2 million to dredge and construct a carrier pier at Mayport. Naval activity intensified in the 1950's because of the demands of the Korean War.

The proposal for a full-fledged base at Mayport, which had been submitted to Congress in 1948, included an additional \$15 million for major upgrades to Jacksonville NAS, Green Cove Springs Auxillary field (later Lee Field) and a Navy oil terminal near Blount Island. Mayport is now a major Navy base (third largest naval surface fleet concentration in the U.S.) with a protected harbor that can accommodate aircraft-carrier sized ships. The USS Lake Champlain was the first carrier to call Mayport its home. Due to the decommissioning of all conventionally powered carriers by the Navy, no carriers are presently assigned to Mayport. However, in 2010 the Quadrennial Defense Review Report stated that a nuclear carrier would be home ported at Mayport. This would help protect the fleet against a potential terror attack, natural disaster or accident, and all carriers were currently based at Naval Station Norfolk.

The Navy continued to grow in the Jacksonville area throughout the 1970's and 1980's, especially with the activities of King's Bay Naval Submarine Base in St. Marys, GA, about 40 miles to the north. The base is currently (as of 1999) the home port for 10 Trident nuclear submarines. The annual economic impact, in 1999, from King's Bay was conservatively estimated at \$6.1 billion.

During a 1991 operation against Iraq, called Operation Desert Storm, the U.S. Marine Corp Facility at Blount Island shipped more cargo to the Persian Gulf area than any other (Continued on page 3)

### **ACVA Update**

2013 was a very successful vear for the Adams Class Museum project in Jacksonville Florida The Adams Class Veterans Association and the Jacksonville Historic Naval Ship Association have noted accomplishments these among others:

1. A Jacksonville City Ordinance was unanimously passed supporting the installation of former USS Charles F. Adams (DDG-2) as the centerpiece of a downtown museum.

2. The Downtown Investment Authority unanimously passed a resolution supporting the project.

3. Overwhelming support for the project in a poll conducted by the Jacksonville Business Journal. Of all the projects proposed for downtown, the ship museum gained 62% support vs *all* other proposals.

4. Hosting a triple Adams class reunion

5. Numerous other successful activities such as the Salute to Veterans Road Race, and the Fall Party at the Shipyard.

On December 6, 2013, the USS New York (LPD-21) was the first of a three ships assigned to an amphibious ready group to arrive at her new homeport of Mayport. The USS New York is unique in that steel from the World Trade Center, destroyed on 9/11, was used in her construction.

Today, Jacksonville NAS stands at the forefront of antisubmarine readiness. It is home to Patrol Squadron Thirty (VP-30), the Navy's largest patrol squadron and the only P-3 Orion and P-8 Posiedin Fleet Replacement Squadron. Jacksonville NAS is also a Aviation Maintenace training facility for several aviation ratings.

There are approximately 14 combat ships homeported in Mayport, and that includes four DDG's. The DDG's homeported in Mayport include the USS Carney (DDG-64), USS The Sullivans (DDG-68), USS Roosevelt (DDG-80) and USS Farragut (DDG-99). Mayport Naval Station is also home to the U.S. Fourth Fleet, reactivated in 2008 after having been deactivated in 1950.

Through it all, Jacksonville continues to be the most soughtafter duty station of Navy men and women.
